

Looking back on 2022, we are grateful for the continued support of our community, visitors, and supporters, as well as for the remarkable contributions of our devoted colleagues. We joyfully welcomed over 30,000 visitors from all around the world both virtually and in-person. They were drawn to our compelling immigration story, resonating with the experiences of Eastern European Jewish immigrants who sought freedom and a new life in a new land. Their engagement with our exhibitions, tours, programming, and landmark synagogue reaffirmed the relevance of sharing and preserving these historical narratives.

In June 2022, we were delighted to resume our beloved "Egg Rolls, Egg Creams, and Empanadas Street Festival" in-person, celebrating the cultural diversity of our neighborhood with thousands of people in our community. Additionally, the long-awaited "Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire Cantata" concert with Yale Strom, performed after an extended, pandemic-incurred delay, was a moving tribute to the lives lost and a testament to the impact that tragedy had on our city.

Accessibility remained a priority as we introduced a state-of-the-art listening system to enhance the experience of guests hard of hearing. Likewise, we forged new partnerships to provide specialized programs for visitors with dementia and their caretakers. We also took significant steps to ensure public safety and the security of our historic building. Partnering with Immigrant Social Services, we provided anti-hate training to our staff and volunteers to foster an environment of unity and compassion in our community.

Our annual gala at the beautiful Bryant Park Grill was a heartfelt celebration, honoring our longest-serving, dedicated volunteer docents who selflessly served the Museum for a combined 100+ years. Their passion for preserving history has left an indelible mark on countless visitors across the last quarter century.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the generous contributions of our donors. Your support has enabled us to preserve and share the rich heritage of the Lower East Side and Eastern European Jewish immigrants and their impact on New York and beyond.

We thank you all for your support in sharing our universal, enduring immigrant story with the world.

SOME PARTICULARLY MEANINGFUL REVIEWS OUR VISITORS LEFT FOR US IN 2022 INCLUDE:

2022 exemplified recovery and growth for the Museum at Eldridge Street. As we began the year, New York continued to see the real impacts of the pandemic on tourism; by the fall, the Museum had hit its stride.

From September to December, the Museum saw one of the highest surges of visitors in the Museum's history. By the end of the year, we had welcomed 14,312 general admission visitors, above the Museum's historic average. We also welcomed 448 visitors for 26 private tours. Our visitors came to us from all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and 79 nations across six continents. They include:

Among the many highlights in 2022 includes the growth of partnerships and our presence on social media. This growth corresponds with an increasing number of visitors indicating that they had learned about the Museum on our social media platforms including Instagram, Facebook, and TikTok.

Ultimately, the best metric is and has always been the experience we provide for our visitors. We saw this everyday as we interacted with our guests of all backgrounds, and learned about how much they enjoyed their time with us and left with a greater understanding of the history and culture of our historic synagogue, the neighborhood, and the people who called (and still call) the Lower East Side home.

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In every tour and program, our Education team uses the Museum as a time capsule to transport their school visitors 100 years ago to talk about the history of immigration and the Lower East Side, as well as Jewish culture and traditions.

We welcomed 3,415 K-12 school and university visitors in 2022. They included old friends from our neighborhood schools and those visiting us for the first time, including the National Endowment for the Humanities Teacher Summer Institute and the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Our school age visitors showed remarkable interest and enthusiasm to learn. One of our young student visitors was so taken by her experience at Eldridge that after her visit, she recreated our entire historic sanctuary out of cardboard; including the ark, bimah, Women's Balcony, and snuff box.

We were delighted to see our school programs have a meaningful impact. All of the reviews the Education Department received praised the quality of the content and the connections between our tours and the school curriculum.

In addition to our education tours, we also resumed our in-person **Cultural After School Adventures (CASA)** program in partnership with **P.S. 1M** and **Councilmember Christopher Marte**. During this 10-week after-school program, students from our local neighborhoods learned about immigrant culinary traditions. Using the immigrant foods of the area, including cannolis, dumplings, and pickles, to name a few, our CASA students traced the immigrant history of New York and their own neighborhoods in Lower Manhattan.

ACCESS

In 2022, Museum at Eldridge Street continued its long-term plan to grow its accessibility programs for visitors with disabilities. We began a year-long grant-funded partnership with Connect2Culture and CaringKind to bring the Museum's historical and cultural offerings to visitors living with dementia and their caretakers. Throughout the year, we explored the story of our historic synagogue, the Jewish Lower East Side at the turn of the century, and our exhibition Steve Marcus: Top Dog of Kosher Pop Art. We also began a new partnership with the Virtual **Senior Center (VSC)** to bring regular educational and cultural programming for older and homebound adults. These programs have been a great success, bringing the Museum's cultural offerings to those who cannot access them otherwise. We look forward to expanding these partnerships and cultural programs.







This year, we organized nearly 50 public programs and received almost 10,000 attendees, both virtually and in-person. Our diverse range of programs included virtual lectures, film discussions, new signature walking tours, and more. The first in-person program held at the Museum since its closure at the beginning of the pandemic was a captivating concert in our beautiful Main Sanctuary, featuring the talented Klezmer violinist, Jake Shulman-Ment. The performance delved into the rich sonic landscape of the An-sky Expedition of 1912–1914, an ethnographic journey across Ukraine that documented the daily lives of Jewish communities in the Pale of Settlement. Remarkably, we welcomed over 150 guests for this momentous reopening of our in-person programming.

Among other notable programs, we joined forces with the Seward Park Library branch of the New York Public **Library** to present an engaging virtual discussion on the historical significance of our Lower East Side community, as seen through the perspectives of our respective institutions. The event attracted an impressive audience of 400 individuals from all around the country and around the globe. Additionally, we collaborated with Isaac Gellis, the great-great grandson of the renowned "Kosher Sausage King of New York" and co-founder of the Eldridge Street Synagogue, for an exciting virtual conversation in conjunction with our temporary exhibition, *Top Dog of* Kosher Pop Art. The Museum is also proud to showcase new walking tours such as an **Activism on the Lower East** Side Walking Tour and Eldridge Eats: A History of the Lower East Side Food Tour.



We were most thrilled to bring back in-person festivities for our 21st annual **Egg Rolls, Egg Creams, and Empanadas Street Festival**. In addition to the vibrant festivities, we formed new partnerships, provided a platform for emerging artists, and sparked meaningful dialogues that celebrated the diverse cultures within our beloved Lower East Side neighborhood.

We closed out the year with a winter family concert, where 480 guests joined us to bring in the last night of Chanukah at Eldridge Street. Folks of all ages, many of whom were young children, sang and danced along to the music of klezmer collective **Litvakus**, led by **D. Zisl Slepovitch**, in collaboration with National Yiddish Theatre Folksbiene actor and singer **Maya Jacobson**. The joyful afternoon ended with the lighting of one of our historic menorahs from our ongoing exhibition *LIGHTING THE WORLD: Menorahs Around the Globe*.



While we initially transitioned our Adult Education courses to Zoom during the pandemic, it opened our programmatic engagement to a larger audience than we could have ever imagined, expanding our reach from New York, to Florida, to London! We continued our ongoing series with our Scholar-in-Residence **Dr. Regina Stein** on **Jewish Mysticism** and **Deuteronomy**, and began new series on **Modernity**, and on **Home, Exile, and Return**. We also expanded a virtual series on major Jewish Holidays with **Rabbi Aviad Bodner**. The Museum's exhibition program continued with **Debra Olin's Every Protection: Folk Belief and Motherhood in the Jewish Pale of Settlement** on view through late April 2022. This show, which opened on October 21, 2021 featured nine large mixed media works and an installation, "From the Oral Torah," made just for this exhibition. Olin explored Jewish myth and culture and a woman's formative experience of childbirth and childrearing through questions in an ethnographic survey created by S. An-sky in Eastern Europe in the years just before World War I. The show gave viewers a window into the minds and memories of the immigrant women who prayed at the Eldridge Street Synagogue in the years following its founding in 1887. An audio guide created by the artist accompanied the show.

From May through October, we exhibited the work of another unique contemporary artist with *Steve Marcus: Top Dog of Kosher Pop Art.* Steve created a series of drawings for the exhibition that focused on what he called one of the greatest Jewish contributions to American culture, the hot dog. The show explored Jewish life and immigrant culture through works on paper, a hand-carved wooden sculpture and selections from the artist's personal collection of hot dog memorabilia, including items relating to Eldridge Street Synagogue founder Isaac Gellis. Marcus recorded an audio guide for the show, which was popular with visitors of all generations.

In November we were pleased to present our first loan show, *Upon Thy Gates: the Elaine K.* and Norman Winik Mezuzah Collection, which came to us from the Oregon Jewish Museum and Center for Holocaust Education in Portland. This beautifully designed traveling exhibition was curated by Kenneth Helphand and presented 73 mezuzahs representing a wide range of styles, materials, and iconography. Dating from the late 18th century through the present, they reflected stylistic influences from Jewish communities in the United States, Israel, England, Ethiopia, Germany, India, Iran, Italy, Morocco, Poland, and more.

Heartfelt thanks to our dedicated Board of Directors, individual, foundation, and government supporters who continue to rise to the occasion and ensure that adequate resources are available to sustain and maintain the historic synagogue and support the robust educational and cultural programming of the Museum at Eldridge Street.

As we continued to rebound from the devastating effects of the pandemic, 1,168 donors made their first gift,

increased their previous year's gift, or made multiple donations in 2022. We received contributions and grants totaling \$1,695,072, representing 89% of the institution's overall income. The remaining 11% came from earned income including building tours and program admissions revenue, gift shop sales, and investment income.

A substantial portion of the Museum's contributed income is derived from our fall Gala. We were delighted to return to the magnificent Bryant Park Grill in-person on November 17 where we

celebrated the 25th Anniversary of the Museum's Docent Program.

Our dedicated volunteers share the stories of the historic synagogue, its original worshippers, and the changing Lower East Side neighborhood with tens of thousands of visitors from all over the world each year. In addition to recognizing all of our volunteer docents, we paid special tribute to those who have served for 20+ years: Roberta Berken, Clarice Feinman, Barry Feldman, Naomi Gat, Lyla Glener,

Anita Graber, and Joyce Shenker.





Their commitment to community service, volunteerism, and stewarding our cultural heritage is truly an inspiration. The event was wonderfully received and raised \$406,284 in support of the Museum's programs and operations.

We are once again deeply grateful to those who remembered the Museum in their wills. Estate gifts are used to continue our restoration efforts and support emergency building needs. In 2022, we received bequests from the estate of a long-time docent, and the estates of other generous donors.

Their names have been added to our 1887 Society roster.

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


2022 INCOME BY SOURCE
